**Personnel**

- ▶ 94 U.S. marshals, one for each federal court district
- ▶ 3,892 authorized deputy U.S. marshals and criminal investigators
- ▶ 1,596 authorized administrative employees and detention enforcement officers
- ▶ 5,488 authorized total employees (does not include the 71 Presidentially appointed U.S. Marshals)
- ▶ 94 districts, 194 sub-offices, four foreign field offices

**Budget**

- ▶ FY 2024: \$1.692 billion (Salaries and Expenses)
- ▶ FY 2024 \$2.1 billion (Federal Prisoner Detention)
